The purpose of this home-based treatment is to ensure that children develop optimally in substance-free, safe and stable homes with their parent/s.

Amy finds meaning in her work by seeing things through attachment and relational lenses. The connecting theme across sectors that draws Amy to Social Work and community services is the transformative impact of secure relationships. She is a Clinical Infant Mental Health Mentor endorsed by The Connecticut Association for Infant Mental Health.
